ZipList makes grocery shopping and meal planning fun and easy. Sign up for a free ZipList account to organize your grocery lists, create weekly meal plans, receive coupons, and sort your favorite recipes. Search the database of more than 300,000 recipes and save your favorites to your personal recipe box. ZipList partners with several popular food and chef sites, letting you save recipes with one click. You can also search recipes added by the ZipList user community, so you'll have no trouble finding whatever you're craving. Once you save a recipe, you can click to add all the ingredients to your shopping list. You can edit the list and remove items you may already have. Free apps for Android and iPhone let you take your grocery lists, checklists, and recipes wherever you go.

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Erly bills itself as "a new social platform for organizing and sharing your personal content." Although most social networking platforms organize data around people first, Erly focuses on collecting information based on shared experiences. Using a model the company calls an "experience graph," users' content is organized around the shared experience that connects them. Erly's current product, called Events, lets users create a Web page for their event. Users can add event details, guest lists, invitations, photos, videos, and more. At any time, anyone on the Event guest list can add stories, photos, links, or other content. Guests can even import content from other services, such as Facebook, Flickr, YouTube, Vimeo, and more.

Meet the site that rewards you for saving. SaveUp is a free rewards program that helps people save money. Choose from a large collection of designs by established and up-and-coming artists, or you can upload your own designs and photos to personalize your creations. For the free designs, you can send up to 250 invites. However, for \$10 you can upgrade your project to pingg Plus, in which you can choose from even more designs from the pingg Plus Designers and send your pinggs to a guest list of up to 2,500 people. pingg also provides extra tools, such as guest list creation, RSVP management, and reminder messages.

Tagged claims it is a "different kind of social network." While most such sites are aimed at helping people stay in touch with others they already know, Tagged focuses more on meeting new people. Once you sign up for an account, you can create a personal profile that reflects your interests, personality, hobbies, and more. Members can then match their personal tastes with other Tagged users and meet new friends. The company claims over 100 million members just waiting to be "tagged."

Pinterest

Yes, you've heard of it. Pinterest is the Web-based virtual pinboard that was launched two years ago but has just recently taken the world by storm. It is a visual social network that lets you organize interesting things you find on the Web by "pinning" images to your "boards," which are arranged by themes. A Pin can be added by using the Pin It toolbar bookmarklet, or by uploading an image from your computer. When you Pin an item, the source link is always included. You can follow other users (and be followed), comment on their pins, and "repin,"



them to your own board. To create a Pinterest account, users must receive an invite from a registered user or request an invite directly from the site. Once you receive an invitation and create an account, you can pin to your heart's content. Pinterest is a great way to gain and share inspiration for DIY projects, wedding plans, home improvement ideas, cooking, and more.



OK, we've looked at Windows 8 Consumer Preview, and ogled the Metro interface, and played with some Metro apps and had some fun, but what about x86 Windows 8?

One of the most noticeable things about Windows 8 Consumer Preview on x86 is that there have been very few updates since it came out. To my mind, that points to two things. 1) Its good behavior and lack of system updates points to a relatively stable release. 2) Its good behavior and lack of system updates points to the fact

that Windows 8 x86 is very little changed from Windows 7.

Apart from some interface changes, x86 Windows 8 appears to be a polished Windows 7. This idea is reinforced by the fact that virtually every program I have on Windows 7 installs and runs out-ofthe-box on Windows 8.

While none of this makes a compelling reason to run out and buy Windows 8 for your PC or laptop, there are still some

in the Windows file system: logical errors and disk defragmentation. The Windows GUI tool performs only rudimentary logical corrections and even when run regularly, will leave behind physical errors that will accumulate until the system eventually fails. Us geeks are accustomed to running the CHKDSK <drive> /R /F command to correct the errors uncorrected by the GUI tool, but you have to know this and remember to do it on a regular basis to prevent disk failures caused by the

file system. Windows 8 takes a step in the direction of awareness, if not automation, by background checking the file system periodically and popping up a notification window when it finds something wrong. You havetocorrectitmanually, but at least you know that it has to be done.

Same goes for Windows Optimize Drive tool that does some rudimentary disk defragmenting, but

improvements that have surfaced after living with Windows 8 for awhile.

Usually, when you install Windows, there are several things that you have to add to it to make it a real-world system. My list includes anti-malware software, a disk defragmenter to replace the lame Windows utility, Adobe Reader for the continuous stream of technical documentation that I deal with and some sort of degunking software to clean up the junk that Windows leaves behind in the course of its normal operations.

Windows 8 has made some attempts to remedy this, more so than previous versions. Their steps in this direction are tentative and elementary, thus we have Windows Defender, the anti-spyware utility that has been expanded to include anti-virus capabilities in Windows 8. (You need to download and install Microsoft Essentials to get antivirus protection in previous Windows versions.)

While we're on the techie side, I feel bound to mention two of the weaknesses in Windows that keeps us geek support people in business. Both of these are weaknesses is easily bested by third party defragmenters (and some free ones). They have made a big improvement though, by upgrading it to perform background defragmentation by default, thus keeping fragmentation below the point where it impacts performance. While I am accustomed to seeing 10-15% fragmentation in Windows file system after only 3 weeks of use (enough to produce significant slowdown), Windows 8 takes no noticeable hit in performance after several weeks of daily use. It's one more thing that makes Windows 8 seem smoother.

On the application side, Windows 8 adds Reader, a utility to display several file and e-book formats for reading. While it displays PDF files OK, it's somewhat clumsier to navigate than Adobe Reader. It does not display the Kindle .mobi format, but does OK with the open source .epub format. It will convert several document types and will also convert to export to accessibility utilities. It's no threat to adobe Reader, but it does have basic functionality.

There are several more accessories included in Windows 8, but these are the ones that stand out as impacting the overall Windows experience. More later.

If you follow the most popular Linux distributions, you have certainly noticed that the desktops have undergone major changes over the last year. Triggered

by the release of GNOME 3, which offered an iconized replacement for traditional menus, other distros have dared to come up with alternatives of their own. developers, weakening every project involved. a Windows-like experience, GNOME has traditionally followed a Mac-like experience. GNOME 3 changed all that. They rethought the desktop and offered an iconized method of navigation similar to tablet computers. Ubuntu, based on GNOME, saw this coming and created

their own iconized desktop toolbar which they called Unity. This dichotomy has divided the Linux desktop for awhile, but it has opened the door for other distros to try their own creations.

This process is known in the developer community as forking, and in the past has led to disunity among navigating through Cinnamon, but it distinguishes itself with snappy response and several structural changes from other taskbar/menu button implementations.

Linux Mint 13 is in RC phase right now, with the release version due in days. Stay tuned, as you are sure to hear more about Cinnamon later on.

FamilySearch.Org. This is a service offered by the LDS genealogy project. Anyone can volunteer to participate in the indexing project, adding records to the database. The 1940 Census has just been released, creating a mountain of new data, much of which will be relevant to people still living. To learn more or to participate, go to familysearch.org and click on the volunteer link. Anyone can join, it's free and there are no affiliation requirements. You can pick the kind of record (e.g., Birth, Draft, Census) you want to index and the geographical area. The experience can give you a peek at life in another time and place. Speak another language? Your skills are highly prized since records from all over the world are included. What do you get for your participation? The satisfaction of contributing to the project.

Member Jan Fagerholm presented an overview of accessibility features built into Windows 7. Many of these tools, such as Screen Reader and Magnification, can be helpful in everyday operation, especially if you're using a small screen such as a netbook. It all starts at Control Panel. Then look for the Ease of Access Center.

The accessibility features can be divided into categories:

» Visual supports make things easier to see.

» Magnifier enlarges the display in the focus area. It might take a bit of practice to learn to locate your target, but text in child windows is not clipped the way it is when you change the screen font size.

» Narrator reads text on the screen. (ZoomText is a commercial product that offers more features. For less money, and fewer features, NaturalReader and ReadFree offer a free version of their text readers as well a paid version with more features.)

» OnScreen Keyboard places a keyboard on the

desktop. When might you want that? When using an itty bitty netbook.

» The Windows 7 built-in speech recognition application works quite well. It is usually necessary to go into Sound and Boost the microphone for any speech recognition application. (The commercial program Dragon Naturally Speaking [Dragon Dictate on the Mac platform] has more features.) Both have options for controlling the computer as well as for text input.

After The Presentations:

There was a question about the Clubhouse, which still has no home.

Andrew Tews warned about the internet virus which has infected many insecure computers, including Apples. As of July 9, insecure computers will be blocked from the internet. Search for "DNS Changer" to find a tool to check your computer and learn more.
