Directions to the PCC Main Meeting

SYSTEM MECHANIC REFUND AVAILABLE

Iolo Technologies has agreed to offer the members of PCC a refund of the purchase price paid if you purchased System Mechanic Standard (\$19.00) or System Mechanic Pro (\$29.00) at our November PCC meeting. The refund offer is only available to members of PCC for System Mechanic versions bought at the NOVEMBER 2009 meeting.

To receive the refund, you will be required to mail the product that you received at the meeting from the presentation team. They would like the box and CD with the activation key; if you no longer have the box, you need to return the CD and the activation key. Note: The activation key is located in the CD box (case) on a sticker. Once iolo Technologies receives the product they will check their records to verify the purchase (remember the order form you filled out). Once verified they will issue and mail a check to you for the amount of purchase.

Your product return must be postmarked no later than March 12, 2010. There will be no exceptions to this cutoff date. The normal return policy of iolo is 30 days.

If you purchased System Mechanic somewhere else, this refund offer does not apply to you.

ADDITIONAL PERSONAL COMMENTS:

It appears that the majority of the members who ran into problems with System Mechanic were running Windows 7 64 bit as their Operating System. Since our November meeting there have been several updates to System Mechanic. The version we received in November was version 8.5.2, the current version is now 9.5.5. I had two computer systems run into problems after the installation of System Mechanic 8.5.2. One system required a complete clean reinstall of Windows 7. I uninstalled System Mechanic from all my systems.

In the process of working with the tech support staff to try to discover what was causing the problems, I reinstalled

System Mechanic (9.5.3) to see if we could recreate the problem. However, we could not. Since the reinstall, System Mechanic has worked perfectly on the 2 computers that I had the original problems on. I also reinstalled System Mechanic on another system that I was having minor problems with and am very pleased to say that System Mechanic discovered the problem and repaired it. I am now satisfied and confident that System Mechanic 9.5.5 is stable and safe to use. I will be reinstalling it on all my systems.

ZoomText Express 1.02

Ai Squared is back with an update to their screen enhancement utility for the general market. ZoomText Express is the Ai Squared remake of their ZoomWare screen usability enhancement utility. Starting over 20 years ago, deeply in the Assistive Technology field with ZoomText, a set of utilities that provides tools for users whose vision prohibits or seriously limits computer use, Ai Squared became the acknowledged leader in screen enhancement for visually impaired users.

Just a couple of years ago, Ai Squared approached the open market with a 'lite' version of ZoomText. Intended mainly for the aging Boomer population wave, ZoomText Express offers the most commonly needed enhancements at a fraction of the cost of the flagship application. Many of the tools also help folks with other disabilities, such as learning differences. Changes in background and font color can make a significant difference for some readers in accessing text. The enhanced cursor helps redirect attention as well as eyeballs to the right spot on the screen.

Do you want ZoomText Express? Do you want ZoomText (the full-featured program)? It depends on your current and projected needs. Fortunately, Ai Squared offers trial downloads so that you can experiment and see (literally) whether the full-featured program is going to give you almost eight times the benefit, or whether Express is enough to take the pain out of screen viewing for you. While Express goes up to 2 x magnification, ZoomText goes to 36 x magnification. For an extra \$200, ZoomText Magnifier/Reader incorporates a screen reader. For over a decade, this was the absolute gold standard of screen readers. While other developers have made excellent strides in catching up and widening this market, ZoomText Reader is still a superior tool and is well-integrated into the ZoomText utility. If you need a screen reader, the extra trouble presented by incorporating third-party software may quickly provide frustration rather than assistance. Still wondering? Check the feature comparison at http:// www.aisquared.com/products/more/compare products by product type/.

Onward with ZoomText Express, the mass market offering. I already had ZoomWare (the previous incarnation of Express) on the computer I use for demonstrations and assessments. The first step in the upgrade process was finding my serial number, which meant finding the installation CD and package, since the program wouldn't open at all after my move from Vista to Windows 7. The installation process was a bit of a hassle. I had to download

the trial version a second time in order to get it to load and then I found that, unlike all other Vista-ready software so far tried, this application does not run under Windows 7. Three blue-screens and an extended check-disk later, I went to my XP-based netbook. There's a screen that could use some enhancing.

The features of ZoomText Express are essentially the same



as in ZoomWare. The interface is a bit more sensible to me and either someone heard my complaint about getting the CD out of the case or my fingers have been trained in disk removal over the past year. The CD came out without a fight. The drop in price from \$149 to just \$49 certainly makes it a much more accessible product.

The ZoomText Express tool bar is clean, neat and wellorganized. This is especially appreciated in a product designed for users for whom visual clutter is particularly detrimental. While one can, with effort, achieve many of the ZoomText enhancements via Windows and word processor settings, it is convenient to have them all in one place. And the ease of management makes them accessible to the novice user.

I particularly like the fact that the tool bar floats above any window and I that can put it wherever I like, moving it if *Continued on Page 7*

its real estate suddenly covers the part of the screen that I need. (I am amazed over and over at the genius and skill of programmers who consistently place a fixed window or box exactly over the data I'm seeking.)

What are the enhancements? Under the Express Menu Button (in the upper left corner)



Express Menu Button:

Save Settings: This one is clear: lock in what I just did to the interface

Restore Settings: Go back to the last set of saved settings

Help: Help!! The familiar interface

Product: Not too many mysteries in this section (Purchase - Activate - Register - Check for Updates - Transfer Activation - About ZoomText Express)

Options: (button below window of choices above)

Program:Start ZoomText Express automatically when the system starts

Display a ZoomText Express icon on the desktop

Prompt me before exiting ZoomText Express Check for updates each time ZoomText Express is launched Enable ZoomText Express error reporting via the internet

Interface:

Enable live preview Enable tooltips

Hotkeys: I'll spare you the long list of hotkey combinations. Many of them are familiar Windows commands, some of them are unique to ZoomText. Having an alternate to the mouse is especially appreciated in a utility designed for people who have trouble with physical access to the screen.

Zoom Level: Unenhanced to 2x magnification in four steps

View: Enlarge the whole screen, about 1/6 of the screen, or about 1/12 of the screen: the latter two options act as a magnifying glass that you can move around with your mouse around over any section of the screen to enlarge just one portion–leaving the rest at standard size.

Color: Normal, reverse/inverse colors, or lightly tint all the white space any of 21 shades. The best choice will vary individually, so it's good that there are so many. I appreciate that hovering over the selection gives a preview of the results. No need to make a selection, check it, exit if you want to try another, and go around the loop trying to remember what you thought of each color combination.

Pointer: Having trouble finding the mouse arrow? Change it to one of 9 colors. Bright red works for me.

Cursor: Does that pesky I-beam that shows where you're inserting characters blend into the letters on the screen? (Particularly the letter after H or the one before M?) Put a transparent colored pyramid at the top and bottom, extending up into the white (or shaded) space between lines of print, but not hiding anything.

Do you get up from every computer session with a headache and/or burning eyes? Do you squint just a bit to read your screen? Give Zoom Text Express a try. Highly recommended as an easy, low-cost way to make your computer screen more eye-friendly.

The Penguin Partition Linux for Human Beings

If you catch the computer buzz, you know that the buzzword(s) this year are "Cloud computing".

What is it? It's the idea that you don't need

applications installed on your computer to use documents. The application, such as word processor, spreadsheet, etc. lives on a server somewhere and you run it over the network, and your documents may live on your computer or even on another server over the network.

The advantage to this is obvious from the enterprise point of view: maintenance of the application software is simplified by orders of magnitude with the application installed on a single server computer instead of being installed on each client computer. The hardware for the client computers is much simpler and cheaper as well.

The fundamental difference between the thin client model and the Cloud

computing model is the Internet. To be sure, thin client computing will continue in the enterprise, but going "Cloud" will allow it to be used outside of the enterprise as well, using less expensive hardware by using the same applications inside and outside the building.

The best analogy for the concept is the way we do e-mail. With client-side computing (what our normal PCs are) you have something like Outlook or Eudora or some

other client software installed on your computer. To get your e-mail, you start the client software application on your computer, then use it to get your e-mail, which is typically downloaded to your computer in the process. If you use Web mail, you get your e-mail through your Web browser, and both the e-mail application and the e-mail itself live on a server somewhere out there on the Internet (the Cloud). Where "the rest of us" begin to enter



the picture is with the wildly successful Netbook computers, particularly those on the

lower end of the species.

So, what's Cloud computing to the rest of us and do we care? It probably won't change clientside computing for the individual, but the interest in Netbooks has spawned an interest in the Cloud. Their portability, built-in wireless networking, and smaller memory and hard drives make them hot candidates for Cloud computing.

Keeping in mind the original concept for Netbooks, using a Web based office suite makes perfect sense for these machines. If you got a Netbook precisely because of its portability, it's also nice to know that your documents don't disappear if the machine is lost or broken. Freely available Web-based office suites such as Google Docs and ZoHo make it easy to try Web based applications to see if it works for you.

He encouraged everyone to provide as much input as possible. Citizens are the eyes and ears that help the city know what services are needed and where. The system is more than cost-effective because it makes provision of services more efficient.

Diane George presented a few features of the new PCC site. The new site is data driven. That makes updating easier. There is a function for changing the size of the display font.
